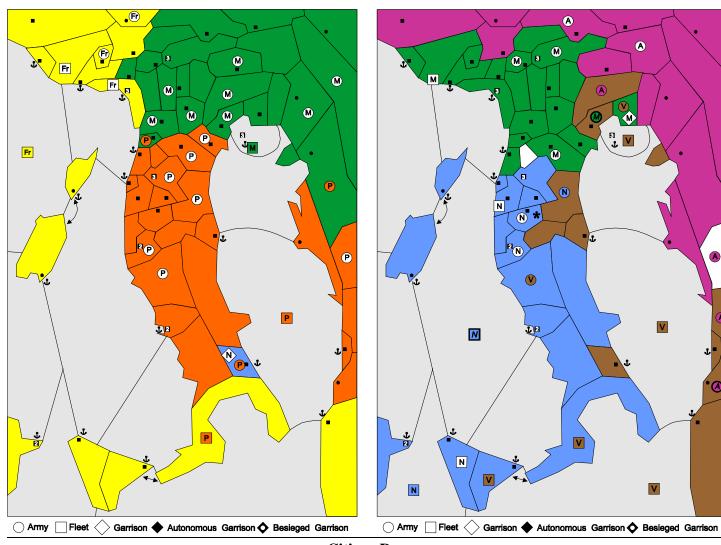

East Jerusalem: The Zionist Conspiracy of Milan unveiled its long-suspected plans for Jewish domination of the Italian-speaking world with a pre-emptive 'targeted assassination' campaign against the peaceful Muslim populations of the Tyrol. 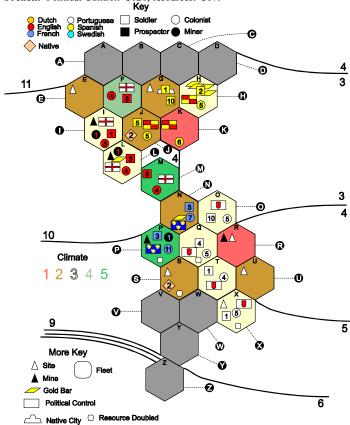

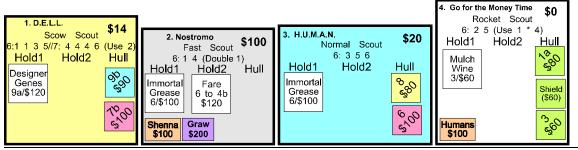

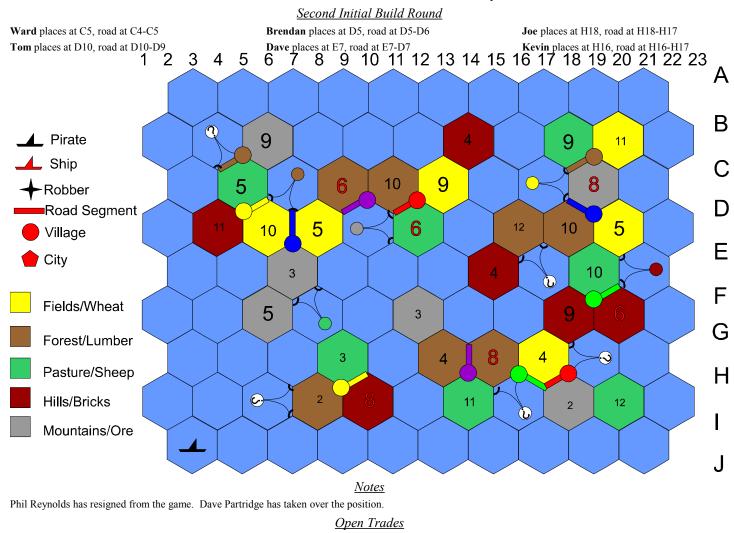

Pedagoguery

There is ample evidence that the universe contains far more matter than what we can see using the electromagnetic spectrum. What, then, is the nature of this "dark matter?"

The most obvious answer is that the dark matter is simply baryonic matter (i.e. matter made up of protons, neutrons, and electrons like us) that doesn't emit enough radiation to be detectable. How correct is this assumption, however? What form can this matter take such that it does not emit detectible levels of radiation? One such form would be cold, diffuse gas. However, there does not appear to be anyplace for the gas to reside. In order to have the desired effect on the dynamics of galaxies or galaxy clusters, there would have to be so much of it that it would be detected. You would see a lot more nebulosity where this gas occurred near young, hot stars. In addition, shockwaves from energetic phenomena such as supernovae would show such a gas if it existed. Astronomers see no evidence of it within galaxies or galaxy clusters. How about

between galaxy clusters? Well, it's possible that some gas exists there. There would be no stars or energetic phenomena to give its presence away. However, if there were enough gas there to substantially add to the density of the universe, why didn't it collapse into galaxies? Clearly, any gas between galaxy clusters must be so diffuse that it has negligible impact on the overall density of the universe.

If the missing matter is baryonic and not in the form of diffuse gas, what could it be? Recent searches have focused on compact objects like white dwarves and brown dwarfs. These are known as MACHOs, or MAssive, Compact Halo Objects. Can such objects be detected? The possibly surprising answer is yes. What you do is to monitor a dense star field, such as the Sagittarius arm of our galaxy or the Large Magellanic Cloud. By keeping a constant watch on the stars in the field, you can potentially catch a MACHO passing in front of a background star. Then, because of gravitational lensing, the background star appears to brighten in a very characteristic manner over the course of several days. By observing this phenomenon over time, you can statistically project the maximum number of MACHOs in an area, and from that, project how many of them reside in our galaxy's halo. A number of such studies have been conducted, and they have found evidence of MACHOs. However, they do not appear numerous enough to make up more than a small fraction of the missing mass.

There is one other way to put an upper limit on the baryonic matter in the universe, and it has to do with the Big Bang nucleosynthesis. During the post-inflationary period of the Big Bang, nearly all of the universe's helium was formed. Along with the regular helium-4, other isotopes were also formed; namely deuterium (hydrogen with one proton and one neutron), helium-3, and lithium-7. These last three are much rarer, and their abundances are strongly dependent on the baryon density during the nucleosynthesis period. Measuring the abundances of these isotopes is difficult, but it is possible, and all of the results so far are consistent with a maximum baryon density of about 3% that required to result in a flat universe.

Clearly, then, most of the universe consists of something other than baryonic matter. What is the dark matter, then? Could it be energy contributed by the microwave background radiation? After all, energy and matter are equivalent. A simple calculation can show how much the microwave background contributes. The energy of any given photon is inversely proportional to its wavelength; the shorter the wavelength, the greater the energy. The constant of proportionality is Planck's constant, which is on the order of 10-²⁷ in cgs units. (cgs stands for centimeters, grams, and seconds; the fundamental units of length, mass, and time used in the system.) Assuming a characteristic wavelength of 1 micron, or 10⁻⁶ cm, this yields a per-photon energy of 10⁻²¹. To convert this into its equivalent mass, we need to divide that number by the speed of light squared, or approximately 1021. This means that each photon has a massequivalent of 10⁻⁴² grams. This is an extremely small number. Even given that there are billions of photons per cubic centimeter, their contribution to the overall gravity of the universe is vanishingly small.

So, what does that leave us? Well, in the 1950's a new particle was theorized as a result of some observed anomalies with beta decay. Beta decay happens when a neutron decays into a proton and electron. The anomaly was that when they added up the energy of the proton and electron, and compared it to the initial neutron, some energy was missing. This led scientists to theorize that a light, hard-to-detect particle was carrying away the missing energy. (This was very much preferable to abandoning the principle of conservation of energy.) This particle was called the neutrino, or "little neutral one." Neutrinos were initially thought to be massless, but recently there has been increasing evidence to indicate that they have a small, but non-zero mass. Given that tremendous numbers of neutrinos were produced in the Big Bang (approximately as many as microwave background photons), if neutrinos had enough mass, they could account for the missing mass of the universe. How much mass is enough? A calculation indicates that if neutrinos had about 30 eV worth of mass, they would be enough to make the universe flat. (Let me digress here and describe what an eV is. eV stands for electron Volt. It is a unit of energy, but particle physicists like to use it to describe masses of particles. The official definition of an electron Volt is the amount of energy gained by a single electron passing though an electric potential of one Volt. When applied to particles, it refers to the particle's "rest mass," or the energy equivalent of the particle when it is not moving. Therefore an electron has a rest mass of about 500,000 eV, or 500 keV (kiloelectron Volt). A proton or neutron has a rest mass of about one billion electron Volts, or 1 GeV.) What sort of ramifications would massive neutrinos have on our universe? Since they are so hard to detect by themselves, can we detect them indirectly, by the effect they would have on the matter distribution of the early universe? The answer is yes. In the early universe, before electrons and nuclei combined, matter and radiation were in equilibrium. Therefore, matter couldn't clump together under its own gravity because radiation pressure would push it apart. The size of the universe at the point that a component of matter "decoupled" from the radiation determines the scale of the objects that formed first. Since neutrinos decoupled from radiation at the time of the recombination, if they are the dominant form of matter, the size of the universe at that point is comparable to the size of a galaxy cluster. So, if neutrinos are the dominant form of matter, galactic clusters would form first, and galaxies would form later. This is called "top-down" structure formation, since it begins with the biggest structures and later goes to the smaller structures. Does top-down structure formation lead to a universe such as that in which we live? Computer models indicate that top-down structure formation result in a universe that is considerably more "clumpy" than ours. In other words, the universe we see has smaller clusters and more evenly distributed galaxies than any of the neutrinodominated computer simulations. Therefore, if the simulations are accurate, our universe cannot be dominated by neutrinos.

Where does that leave us? We have ruled out all of the more mundane possibilities, so that leaves us with more exotic particles. I will be discussing those next issue.
